FORTAS TELLS THREAT ON HIS LIFE!

Supreme Court Justice Abe Fortas says his life has been threatened because of "incriminating information".

Senator Robert P. Griffin who led the successful fight to block President Johnson's nomination of Fortas to be Chief Justice, revealed a telephone threat on his life Friday at a news conference. "My office in Detroit tells me my life has been threatened" Griffin said. "The threat did relate to my position on the Fortas matter".

Griffin arrived at the news conference accompanied by two plainclothes Detroit policemen. He said the Federal Bureau of Investigation had been notified of the threat, which came to his Detroit office Wednesday and was investigating it.

APOLLO 10 SPLASHDOWN

The Apollo 10 splashed down in the South Pacific today after spending an eight-day trip during which they orbited the moon. Because their trip was successful, the United States should be able to land two men on the moon.

Their spacecraft entered the earth's atmosphere at 24,000 miles per hour. When the ship slowed down to about 300 miles per hour, its parachutes opened and the ship drifted into the water near the recovery aircraft carrier Princeton.

The astronauts had brought past a total of 7 hrs. and 3 mins. from space - more than all the other United States space teams combined.

TWO NEW U. S. DRIVES PUSHED IN VIETNAM

The U. S. command Monday announced two new American offensives in South Vietnam's northernmost provinces and said they were aimed at "capturing or destroying enemy forces, materials and installations".

The two new drives have accounted for 142 North Vietnamese soldiers since they began, one 18 days ago, the other 11 days ago. U.S. headquarters said U. S. casualties were put at 28 killed and 134 wounded.

SIRHAN ARRIVES ON DEATH ROW

Sirhan Busher Sirhan, convicted assassin of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy arrived on Death Row at San Quentin Prison Friday after a secret pre-dawn flight from Los Angeles.

Sirhan was removed from his heavily guarded cell at Los Angeles Hall of Justice and flown by helicopter to an airport in suburban Van Nuys, where the 25-year-old Jordanian immigrant was put aboard a state-owned airplane for the 2 1/2-hour flight north.

He was then turned over to the San Quentin warden, said Los Angeles County Sheriff Itchness, who announced the transfer. Munir Sirhan, 21, replied to a letter written by Kennedy asking the court to spare Sirhan's life.

Munir wrote:

"Dear Sen. Kennedy: How can words tell you what we feel? Your letter was good and full of the compassion our Lord tried so desperately to teach us. The terrible circumstances that created this tragedy must be examined by the conscience of the world.

"This is a terrible double tragedy for your family and for mine. Our family grieves as much for Sen. Kennedy as for Sirhan. Both had dreams of a better world. What a cruel paradox. I want the world to ask as we do: WHY?"

THE PUEBLO

The Pueblo was captured on January 23, 1968, 16 miles off North Korean shores. The Pueblo had two 50 caliber machine guns which were covered with canvas and were not supposed to be shown to the enemy unless very necessary. The canvas was frozen to the guns and were unable to be used. The Pueblo was attacked by 3 torpedo boats, 2 mig fighter planes and a submarine chaser armed with cannons. The North Koreans, while boarding the Pueblo, killed one man. They forced the Pueblo to go to the Korean harbor. The crew of the Pueblo was kept in prison for 11 months. They went through many beatings and other cruel torture. The crew got home to America on Christmas Eve 1968. After their release, a Naval board investigated the captain's actions of surrendering without a fight. Most people say that it was not the captain's fault because he could not defend himself.

CORNELL UNIVERSITY - TROUBLE

At least three top professors resigned from Cornell University since the administration surrendered to a band of armed black students. The students had seized a campus building, threatened to destroy the university if it did not grant their demands, including immunity from punishment, and armed themselves with guns and ammunition.

Dr. James A. Perkins, President of Cornell, has a record of sympathizing with protestors, even when they break laws. The University vice president, Steven Muller, surrendered quickly to the armed students, saying that the University was not equipped to protect life and property, and he did not want to call the police. At first the faculty refused to accept his agreement with the armed students, but later a council of the faculty endorsed the agreement.

The country was shocked to see armed students threatening to destroy a university, and the administration surrendering helplessly. Cornell has clearly shown us that when students are treated as if they do not have to obey public laws as the rest of us do, the results can only be bad. It has also shown that when universities refuse to call for police help when laws are being broken, they are inviting their own destruction.
